MONCTON, NB



We are deeply grateful to God for His faithfulness and guidance thus far. I recall when we left Nigeria in September 2021 as my wife embarked on her academic

journey in the United Kingdom, it was a transition filled with mixed emotions. Upon our arrival, we were warmly received by the brethren at the Apostolic Faith Church in Peckham Branch. Their love and fellowship brought us great comfort and spiritual encouragement.

However less than a year later, an opportunity arose for our family to relocate to Canada through a Permanent Residence offer in New Brunswick, a process we had begun before leaving Nigeria. It felt like a rare blessing, especially compared to our temporary status in the UK.

Before arriving in Canada, we eagerly searched online for an Apostolic Faith Church in New Brunswick and found a branch listed in Fredericton. Unfortunately, after contacting the District Superintendent, Rev. Chris Hewlett, we learned the church had been closed for administrative reasons. He gave us contact information for the closest branch churches that we could visit when possible. This news was confirmed by other brethren who had arrived before us. We felt our best option would be to join brethren in worship by way of ZOOM.

Determined to see God's work continue, we began praying earnestly for the restoration of the church in New Brunswick. Meanwhile, we received immense support and encouragement from the pastors of the Pullman and Winnipeg churches, who welcomed us to join their services online. Despite the time differences, these virtual gatherings became a source of spiritual revival and strength for our family. We even connected with a sister living in our town, and we occasionally worshiped together online on Sundays.

A turning point came when our former pastor in Pullman, now the Superintendent General, visited Moncton briefly with his wife on their way to Winnipeg for the church dedication. He met with some of the brethren in Moncton, prayed with us, encouraged us, assuring us that God would establish a place of worship in New Brunswick soon.

Shortly after, during the dedication program in Winnipeg, we had a meaningful discussion with the Winnipeg Pastor, who conveyed instructions and encouragement from Rev. Chris Hewlett and the Superintendent General, Rev. Olusola Adesope. This prompted us to connect as a group in New Brunswick and form a WhatsApp group for effective communication.

Following a meeting with Rev. Olusola Adesope, Rev. Chris Hewlett, Rev. Samson Jimaza, and other brethren from Saskatchewan, plans were set in motion to establish fellowship in New Brunswick. The meeting was insightful and uplifting, outlining the commitments and responsibilities needed to restart a local assembly.

As a result, we initiated hybrid prayer meetings in Moncton, beginning in our home, with eight people in attendance (six onsite and two online). Over time, attendance grew as brethren from Saint John, Woodstock, and PEI joined us.

We are thankful to God for how far He has brought us and for the unwavering support of the brethren and leadership. We trust Him to continue guiding us as He establishes His work in New Brunswick.



The inaugural prayer meeting began with an introduction by brother Samson Jimaza, who highlighted the privilege of gathering for prayer. He emphasized the importance of focus, dedication, and commitment to witness the great things God will do, even in the face of initial challenges. His personal testimony further inspired and encouraged the group.

The prayer session was led by Samuel Osibanjo, starting with songs of praises. Thanksgiving and praise for God's blessings and the gift of life.

Prayers were made for: Washing in the blood of Jesus, the protection and growth of each family represented, for the growth and expansion of the group in New Brunswick, for the

success of the Dedication Program in Winnipeg and preparation for rapture and being counted worthy.

Progress and Growth

Since the inaugural meeting, the prayer sessions have continued fortnightly on Saturdays, with miraculous growth in attendance. Two families with eight in total, relocated from Nigeria and have since joined our group. The prayer meetings were led by various members, including Femi Hephzibah, Seyi Fajimi, Oluwaseun Osibanjo, Femi Adewoyin. These gatherings have been a time of profound fellowship and spiritual enrichment.

Attendance during our online Zoom prayer sessions has grown to eighteen.

Osibanjo. It was a wonderful time of fellowship, enriched by inspiring testimonies that deeply blessed us. We parted with rejoicing in our spirits.


Later that day, a short service was held with Rev. Chris Hewlett and his wife, which included members of the group

palpable as they eagerly attended the annual gift-giving event. Along with receiving gifts, the children were blessed








by special musical performances and a Christmas puppet show. We are praying that each child left with the understanding that the greatest gift of all is Jesus.
