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ON PURPOSE?

LESSON 27 → Genesis 22:1-14; Isaiah 53:4-8; Hebrews 2:9-10

“Oh, no!” It was only five minutes until the school bus would pull up, and the bowl of cold cereal had just landed in Andy’s lap! “Now what? I’d better change my clothes really fast.”

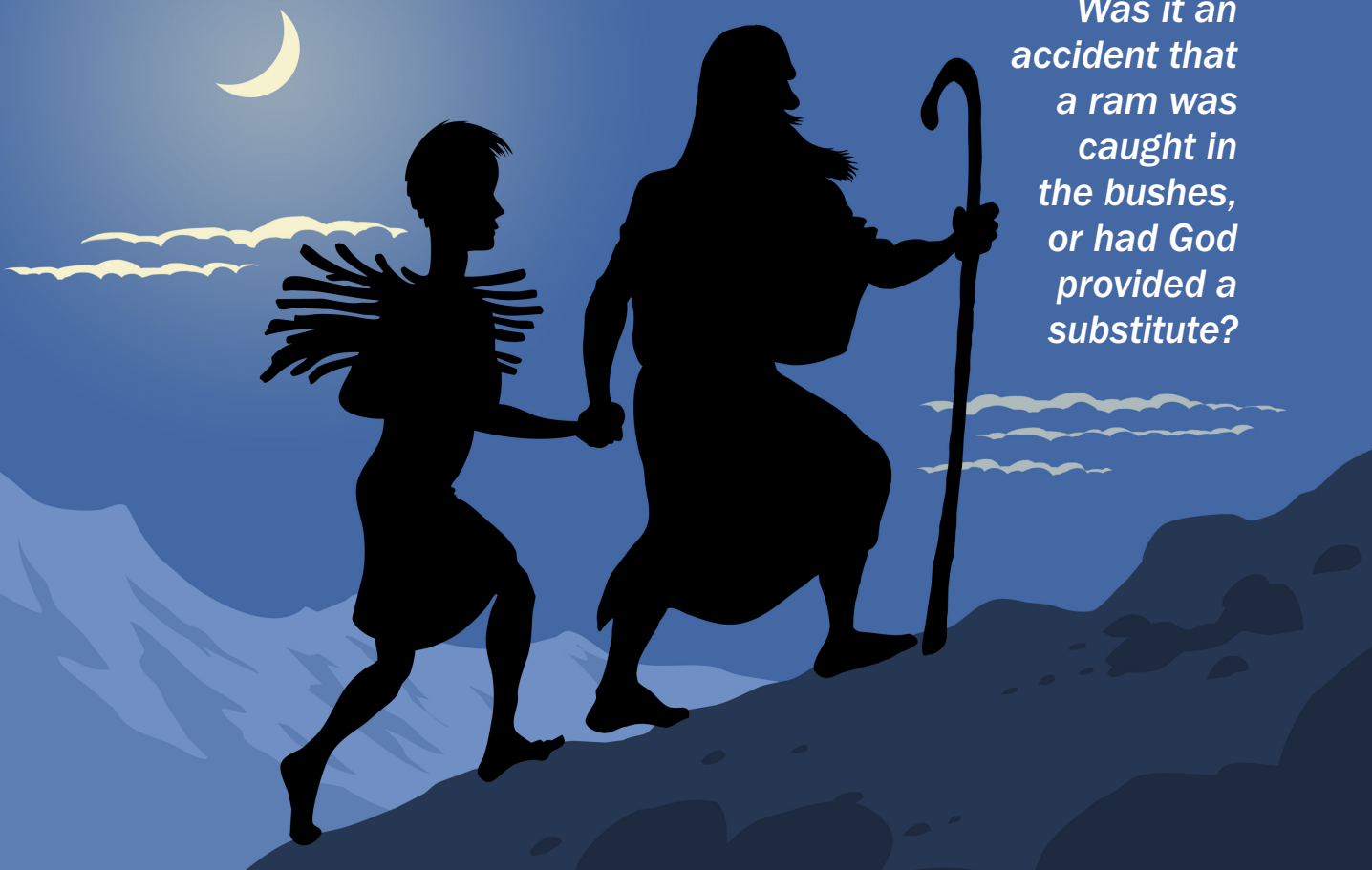
After scraping the cornflakes off his pants and into the garbage, Andy dashed up the stairs two at a time. He grabbed another pair of jeans out of the drawer and tossed the dirty ones into a hamper.

The extra minutes meant Andy had to run all the way to school, but he made it on time. After shoving his jacket into the locker, he slammed the door shut and hurried to his classroom. He looked toward the teacher’s desk as he opened the door. Would Mr. Carter be upset that he was rushing in just as the bell rang? But Mr. Carter wasn’t there. A tall man with glasses looked up from the teacher’s desk instead. A substitute!

Andy probably never stopped to consider it, but already that morning he had witnessed two examples of the word “substitute.” He had substituted a clean pair of jeans for his dirty ones, and he had seen one person take the place of another as a substitute teacher.

The Bible tells us about a man, Abraham, who learned about substitution. Abraham was trying to live his life in a way that pleased God. God appreciated the way Abraham was serving

JESUS TOOK MY PLACE.

My son, God will provide himself a lamb for a burnt offering. — Genesis 22:8

Him, and promised to make him a great nation, and bless him for generations to come by giving him a son, even though he and his wife were very old (Genesis 17:19). They named their son Isaac. He was a good boy and meant much to his parents in their old age.

One day, a startling thing happened. God told Abraham to take Isaac to Mount Moriah and offer him as a sacrifice! Imagine the thoughts that ran through Abraham's mind. Hadn't God promised that this boy would be the beginning of a great nation? What was going on?

Many things could have happened at this point, but the Bible tells us that the very next morning Abraham was on his way to the mountain God had appointed. He hadn't drawn anyone's attention to what he was going to do, asked for anyone's sympathy, or spent time begging God to change His mind. Instead, he set out to follow God's instructions, not knowing what would happen.

Abraham took with him two servants, a donkey, wood, fire, rope, a knife, and his son. On the third day of his journey, Abraham spotted the right mountain. He told his servants to wait with the donkey. He and Isaac would go ahead to worship, and return later. Abraham believed that even if Isaac did die, God would

bring him back to life (Hebrews 11:17-19). He was confident that God's promise to him regarding Isaac would not fail.

Isaac had been taught about sacrifices, and must have helped his father before. As they climbed the mountain, he became curious. He asked, "My father . . . Behold the fire and the wood: but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" He knew they had always brought an animal along. Abraham told him God would provide the lamb. Isaac respected his father's trust in God and didn't press him for details.

After the altar had been built and the wood laid in place, Abraham explained everything to his son in a way that made Isaac willing to be tied up with the rope and laid on the altar. Isaac understood the importance of obeying God. Until now, Abraham had been in this by himself, but at this moment he and Isaac were in it together—both waiting on God. Abraham raised his knife and suddenly an angel called out, "Abraham, Abraham!" He was quick to answer, "Here am I." The angel told him not to harm his son. What relief must have flooded over them!

What was this incident all about? God had been testing Abraham to see if all the promises he had made with his mouth were really in his heart. By Abraham's willingness to

give up what meant the most to him, God could see that He was still first in Abraham's life.

Just then Abraham noticed a ram caught by his horns in some bushes nearby. He took the ram and offered it on the altar in place of his son. Was it by chance that the ram turned up just when Abraham needed it? No, God had provided the offering as a substitute for Isaac.

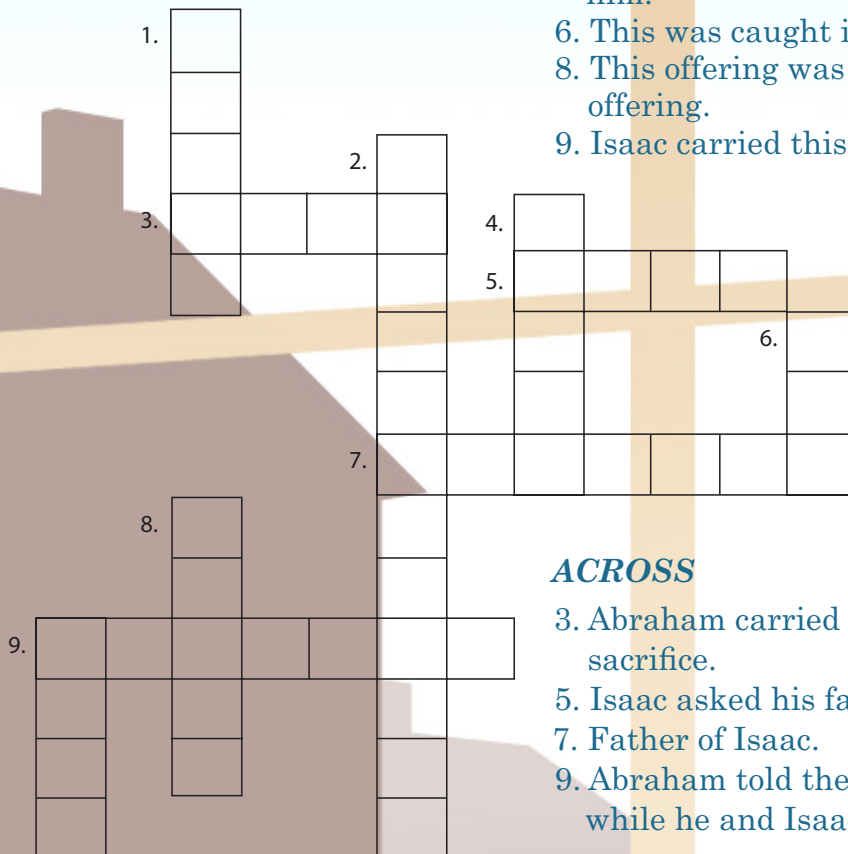
Years later, God's Son would be willing to die on a cross for the sins of all the people in the world. Every man born into this world since the time of Adam is born with sin in his heart. The Bible tells us that the wages of sin is death, so every one of us should have to die to pay the penalty for our sins. But Jesus was willing to be our Substitute. He was willing to die for us.

Abraham loved his son very dearly, and it must have been a hard thing for him to be willing to sacrifice Isaac. Surely, it must have been hard for God to sacrifice His only Son, Jesus, to pay for the sins of mankind. But He did that for us because He loves us.

Jesus became our Substitute and took our sins that we might be saved. We can accept His gift to us by asking Him to forgive us for our sins, and purposing, with His help, to live our lives for Him.

GOD WILL PROVIDE

A NEED FOR PROTECTION

LESSON 28 → Exodus 12:1-14



John had no thought of safety as he prepared for his first hunting trip.



MY PROTECTION IS JESUS.

When I see the blood, I will pass over you. — Exodus 12:13

John stared out the classroom window. He was trying to put his thoughts together so he could start his paper on safety. The teacher had told the students they could choose any form of safety to write about. There were many to choose from: traffic safety, water safety, home safety, . . . the list went on and on. Finally John chose hunting safety. He remembered how excited he had been as he prepared for his first hunting trip last fall.

On the night before he and his dad were to leave, he had packed all the clothes and other gear he thought he would need: extra pants, gloves, cap, sleeping bag, and boots. When he had announced he was ready to go, his dad had taken a few moments to go over the contents of John's pack. After a moment, his dad had looked up with a puzzled frown and said, "John, why didn't you pack that red jacket your mother bought for you to take?"

John had fished in his pack and said, "I packed my old brown one instead. See, here it is. I figured if I wore the red one, the deer would see me. I want to be able to sneak up on them!"

His dad had smiled, but he removed the brown jacket from John's pack. He said, "I can understand your wanting to sneak up on the deer, John,

but don't worry about their spotting your red jacket. Deer don't recognize color, but a hunter will."

John remembered that his dad had gone to the hall closet and come back carrying the red jacket. "Here it is," he said. "Put it in your pack. I'll be wearing mine, too, when we go into the woods tomorrow. It is important. That red jacket could save your life!"

Many years ago the Children of Israel, while being held captive in Egypt, needed protection just as John had needed his red jacket. But it wasn't hunters the Children of Israel needed protection from; it was God's judgment on the Egyptians. God spoke to Moses and told him that His final judgment on Egypt would be the death of the firstborn in every home.

In order for the Children of Israel to be protected, they would have to follow God's command. Moses told each family that God had commanded them to choose from their flocks a lamb that was without blemish. They were to kill the lamb and sprinkle its blood on the top and the sides of the door frame of their home. Just as John's jacket was a sign to the hunters not to shoot, the blood of the lamb on the doorposts would be a sign that the lamb had died and that all of God's com-

mandments had been kept in that home.

The fact that the Israelites had faith in God, and had killed the lambs, did not save them from death. Only by following instructions and applying the blood to the doorposts were they saved. Today it takes the Blood of Jesus to save us from eternal death. When Jesus died on the Cross and rose again, He completed God's perfect plan of salvation. As the truly unblemished Lamb, He shed His Blood that we might be saved.

We must be sure to have the Blood of Jesus applied to our hearts. We do this by praying to Jesus and telling Him how sorry we are for our sins, and that we never want to sin again. He will then forgive us and we will be saved from eternal death.

The night finally came when God's warning to the people in Egypt came to pass. At that midnight hour, the Lord went through Egypt, and in every house where the blood was not applied, the oldest child died.

Just as the blood of the lamb protected the Children of Israel from physical death, so the Blood of Jesus protects us from spiritual death if we ask Him into our hearts.

THE LORD'S SUPPER

LESSON 29 → Matthew 26:17-30; 1 Corinthians 11:23-34

JESUS SHED HIS BLOOD FOR ME.

For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins. — Matthew 26:28

It was an exciting day in Jerusalem. There was so much to be done. The city was bustling with activity. As Jesus' disciples walked along the dusty road, they could see that everyone was getting ready for Passover. They were to observe this feast in remembrance of what God had done for the Children of Israel many years before when He had brought them out of the land of Egypt. Jesus' disciples needed to make preparations also. As this was one of the most important feast days of the year, they wanted everything to be just right. First, they needed to find a place where they could all gather together with Jesus for the meal. He had told them they would find the perfect room if they looked for a certain man in the city carrying a pitcher of water.

They were nearing the city square now, so they began to watch carefully. Their eyes strained against the bright afternoon sun. "Look!" one of them exclaimed, pointing across the square. From behind a building a man came walking briskly through the crowd. He headed straight toward them! In one of his hands was a large pitcher. Could this be the man? Quickly, they walked over to meet him. As they stopped in front of him, they repeated the message Jesus had given them: "The Master saith, Where is the guestchamber, where I shall eat the passover with my disciples?" (Mark 14:14).

Without even a pause the man turned, motioning for them to follow him. Through the streets and lanes they made their way to a large house where they followed him up the stairs. There the man led them into a large room, all furnished and ready for their use.

That evening, as they sat, ready to eat the Passover meal, Jesus took some bread and began to bless it. The twelve disciples listened reverently as He prayed. When He finished, He began to break the bread in pieces and pass it to His disciples saying, "Take, eat: this is my body, which is broken for you: this do in remembrance of me" (1 Corinthians 11:24). While

they were eating, Jesus took a cup, and after He gave thanks and drank from it, He gave it to them saying, "Drink ye all of it; for this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission [forgiveness] of sins. But I say unto you, I will not drink henceforth of this fruit of the vine, until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom" (Matthew 26:27-29).

Jesus was to die for everyone's sins the next day. No longer would it be necessary to offer sacrifices for sins. There would be no more need to observe the Passover, since Jesus had come to fulfill that promise. His Blood would be shed for the sins of people in all generations.

When we observe the Lord's Supper today, we are not celebrating the Passover. We observe the Lord's Supper in remembrance of Jesus' Body that was broken, and His Blood that was shed for our sins. Without Jesus' shed Blood there would be no chance for us to have our sins forgiven.

We are told in the Bible that when we partake of the Lord's Supper (also called "Communion"), we need to examine our hearts to make sure that we do not take it unworthily. We are to make sure there are no bad feelings in our hearts toward anyone, and that our sins are forgiven.

The Bible says, "He that eateth and drinketh unworthily, eateth and drinketh damnation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body." The Lord's Supper is a serious observance for all Christians. It should not be taken lightly.

The Bible also tells us that as often as we eat the bread and drink from the cup, we are keeping Christ's death fresh in our minds till He returns. The Passover was a Jewish feast looking back to their forefathers' deliverance from the land of Egypt. The Lord's Supper is the Christian's remembrance of the Lord's death until He returns the second time to take us with Him to Heaven.

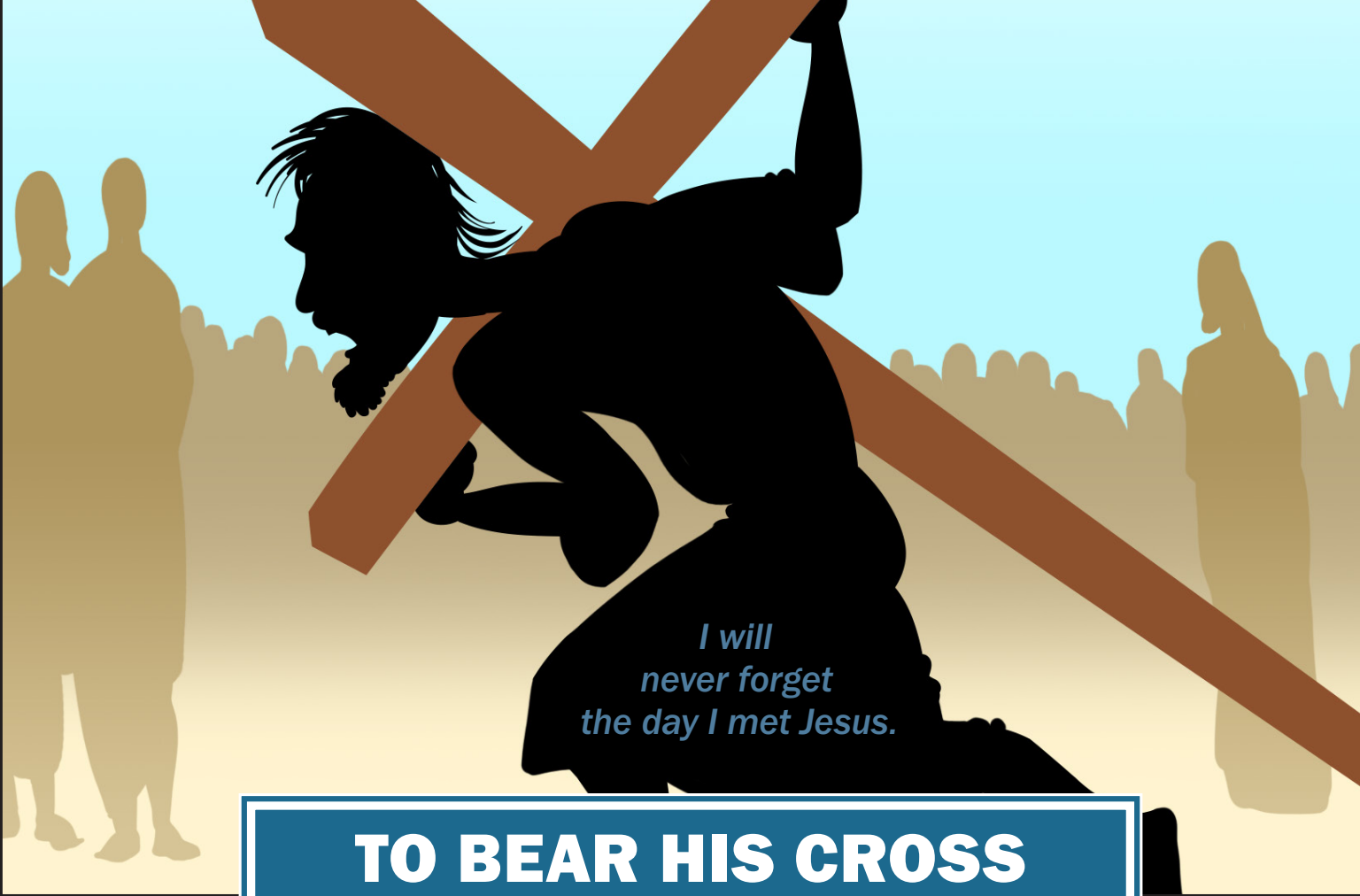

TO BEAR HIS CROSS

LESSON 30 → John 19:1-30

The city of Jerusalem was jammed. Yes, this was the eve of the Passover, but surely this throng I found myself in was unusual. I glanced over the heads of some of those about me. They seemed to be moving along together. I turned to work my way out of the crowd, with the intention of going down a side street. So intent was I on getting through, that I suddenly bumped into someone. I looked up into the face of an angry Roman soldier. Grabbing me, he shouted,



“You’re just who we need!” As he pulled me with him, I tried to hang back, explaining that I was new in the city, that I had just come from Cyrene. He didn’t seem to hear me. I was never more afraid in my life.

What could the soldier mean, that I was just who they needed? His rough

grasp on my arm hurried me through the crowd. I looked about . . . was there no one who would help me? But I could see that there was no help for me here. This



crowd was angry, and their faces reflected it.

Suddenly the soldier pushed me in front of a Man bearing up under a heavy cross of timber. I looked at the body of this Man, and it horrified me. Covered with blood from the slashes of a whip, it was evident that He was badly hurt. I looked into His face, expecting it to be hardened and cruel—the face of one deserving such a fate. To my surprise, love shone through saddened eyes which seemed to look deep into my soul. Blood dripped from the

horrible crown of thorns pressed on His head, but His mouth, all bruised and swollen, smiled at me.

I was shoved beneath the cross and told to carry it to Golgotha, just outside Jerusalem. Thoughts raced through my mind as I struggled under the load. Who was this Man? What had He done?

When we arrived, the soldiers pushed me aside. Two other men were being raised on crosses. I looked up at them. They were hardened and angry looking. Turning back, I shuddered as I watched them nail this Man to the cross I had just carried. Then they lifted Him up and set His cross into the hole between the other two crosses.

Standing off to the side a bit, I heard Him say, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do." Who was this Man who could say, "Forgive them," even though in pain and suffering, and knowing the worst was yet to come?

I asked several people standing there. One said he didn't know of anything terrible He had done, but he knew that His name was Jesus, and that He had healed his brother who was a leper. I asked another and he shrugged his shoulders, saying, "How should I know? The priests said, 'He thinks that He is the Son of God.'"

As the time wore on, I found myself unable to leave the gruesome scene. I heard the people screaming at Jesus, yelling, "If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." Then a strange thing happened. The sky began to grow darker and darker. Soon it was as dark as night, even though it was only a little after noon. Fear and tension gripped the crowd. What was happening? I heard one of the men on the cross next to Jesus say, "We deserve to die for what we did wrong, but this Man has done nothing wrong." Then Jesus cried out, "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit."

Suddenly, I fell to the earth as the ground shook terribly. The rocks broke apart and tumbled down the sides of the hill. Dust filled the air. The noise and screams of everyone was awful!

After what seemed an eternity, it grew calm. I looked at the centurion who stood gazing up at Jesus hanging dead on the cross. He wiped the sweat and dust from his face and said, "Truly this was the Son of God."

I can tell you, I will never forget that day. The scene on that dark hillside is as vivid in my memory as though it happened just yesterday. To think that I saw Him die, that I helped

carry the cross which brought death to God's own Son!

The story of the Crucifixion, as Simon of Cyrene might have told it (Matthew 27:21), brings a question to our minds. Why did Jesus leave all the beauty and happiness and love in Heaven to come to earth to hang on the cross and suffer so terribly?

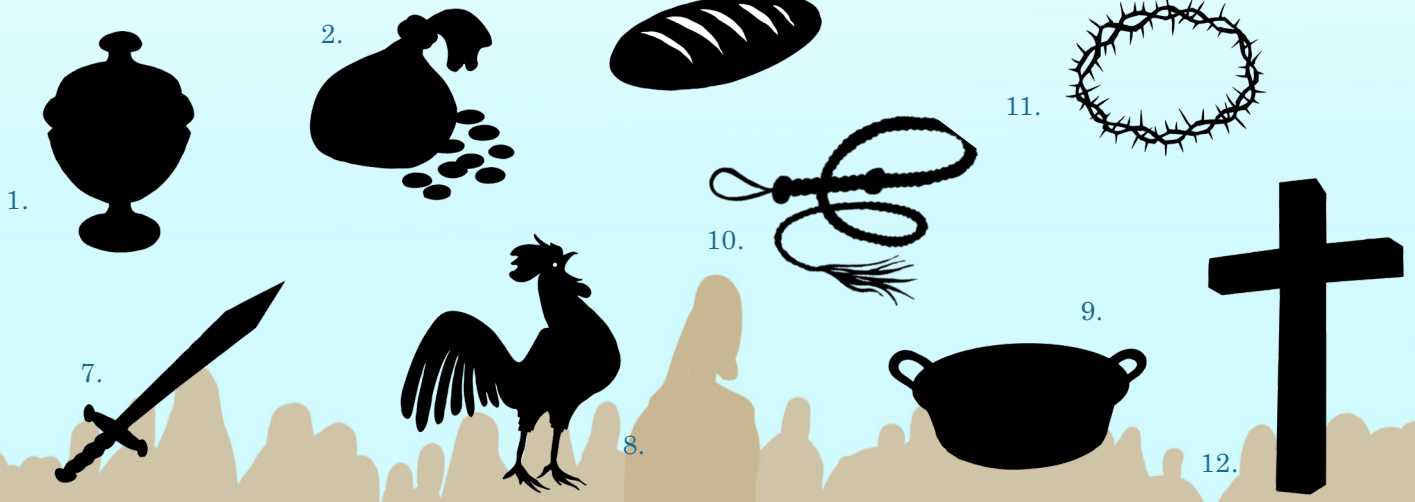
He did it so we could come to the Father and ask forgiveness for our sins. Because of Jesus' shed Blood, God could then say, "You are forgiven."

It wasn't just chance that Christ died on the eve of the Passover. He was the perfect Lamb of God. Only when His Blood is applied to our hearts can we be set free from sin and eternal death.

He is a wonderful Savior. He loves us so much that He went through all the pain and suffering so we could be called the sons of God and live with Him in happiness and joy, now and throughout all eternity.

LESSON 31 → John 20:1-18

Jesus rose victorious after three days.

It seemed to push a huge lump into her throat, and it brought tears to her eyes. Mary was troubled by all that had happened the past few days. She just couldn't make any sense out of it.

Mary remembered that Jesus had always been so loving, gentle, and kind. She had been surprised that a man could live only for others as Jesus had done. He did not spend any time working to make a name for Himself or to make Himself comfortable on this earth. He had a special place in His heart for people who were sick, lonely, poor, or who had been rejected by society as hopeless. Mary

had seen Jesus perform miracles that changed people's lives. She had heard Him teach people how to live godly lives, and about a beautiful place He would prepare for all those who lived by His commandments.

Mary had been sure that Jesus had all the answers. He had been sent by God to be King of the Jews. But now . . . it was all over. Her mind replayed

the agonizing events of the past three days. Faces of an angry mob, the sound of their voices shouting, “Crucify Him, crucify Him!” The marks on His back showing where they had beaten Him. The pain and sorrow on His face as He bore the heavy cross they placed on Him. Then to see Him hanging on that cross, crucified between two thieves like a common criminal. Oh, how could she stand the pain of remembering?

Now it seemed that all of their dreams were shattered. He was dead! What had gone wrong? Where could she go for an answer? Who could she turn to? What did the future hold for those who had followed Him?

As Mary came close to the tomb she saw that the stone which had covered the entrance to the tomb, and had been sealed with Pilate’s seal, was rolled back. Fear gripped her. Jesus’ body had been stolen! She turned and ran, her first thought being to tell the disciples. Finding them, her news tumbled out. Immediately two of the disciples rushed to the tomb to see for themselves. Mary was right! The tomb was empty. Peering anxiously in at the entrance, they saw the linen clothes that Jesus had been wrapped in. The cloth that had been around His

head was folded and placed by itself. The disciples’ hearts had been filled with sorrow these past three days. But now, maybe, just maybe, there was hope. Could it be that Jesus had risen and was alive again? With hope returning, they ran to tell the others.

Mary stayed behind and wept beside the tomb. So much had already gone wrong, and now they didn’t even know where Jesus’ body was! As Mary sobbed with grief, she glanced into the tomb. There, to her surprise, she saw two angels! They asked her why she was crying, and she poured out her story to them. Tearfully she turned away from the tomb and saw a man behind her. A tender voice inquired, “Woman, why weepest thou?” Thinking that He was the gardener, she poured out her story to Him too. Then He spoke her name: “Mary.”

Suddenly she realized that she was talking to Jesus! All she could say in her astonishment was, “Master!” What joy filled her soul! Jesus then told Mary to go and tell His disciples that He was alive, and that He had talked with her. What joyous news to tell!

Mary had loved Jesus dearly, but like a lot of people today, she had not been fully aware of the power that He possessed.

She had limited the Lord without even knowing it. It was true that Jesus had been a good Man, and had done no wrong. But He was so much more than that! Now He was alive again, having come forth from the grave.

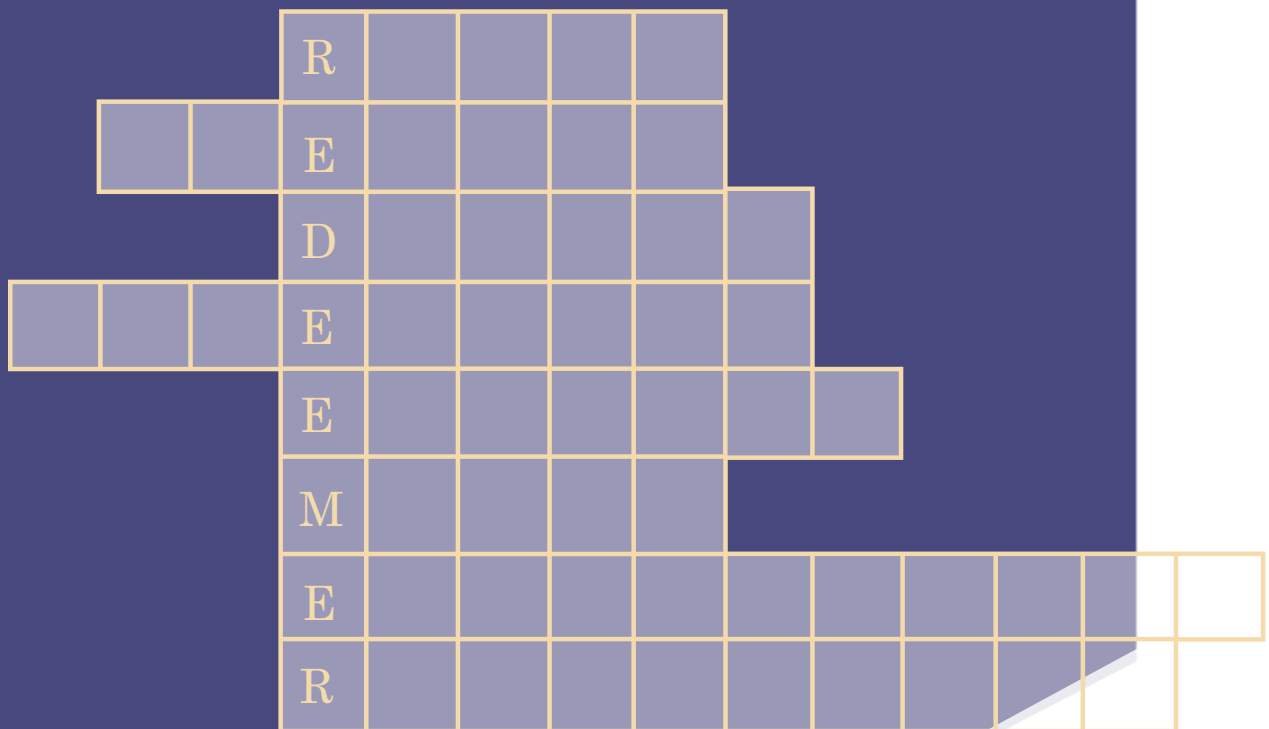

Instead, his mind went back to the trouble he had gotten into during the past few months: throwing an egg at Mrs. Casper’s window; taking Mr. Hutchins’ wrench without asking, and blaming it on his friend; teaching Rags to knock down little kids, and then laughing when they cried.

That is what he had done yesterday to Madison: laughed when she had cried. Aiden felt awful. I wish I had never done those things, he thought. What could he do to make up for his wrongdoing? He could get a paper route and pay for the ruined toys; he could mow the lawn and empty the trash to help Mom; he could even be nice to Madison so that she would trust him again. But how could he get rid of the guilt for having been so mean? How could he get rid of this awful feeling inside?

He looked back down at the Bible and finished reading, “and let him return unto the LORD, and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.” He remembered now that his dad

had said God would forgive those who were genuinely sorry for the wrong things they had done.

As he thought about how rotten he had been toward others, tears came to Aiden’s eyes. Then he prayed, “God, I’m so sorry for the way I’ve been acting. I don’t want to be like that anymore. Please come into my heart and make a change, so I can live for You from now on.”

WE FEEL BRAND NEW!

Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new. — 2 Corinthians 5:17

Picture in your mind a field on a warm, sunny spring day. Notice the green grass waving in the breeze. Everything seems so fresh and new. The birds are singing as they feed their newly-hatched young. And there, flitting among the flowers, is one of God's most beautiful and delicate creatures, the Monarch butterfly. With perfectly formed orange and black wings, it effortlessly glides to each waiting flower. Surely this delicate creature deserves its title of Monarch.

But where did such unique beauty begin? Each butterfly started its life as a fuzzy, insignificant caterpillar. Through one of God's many miracles in nature, that caterpillar formed a chrysalis, or cocoon, about itself and went through a major transformation. One day it emerged from the cocoon as a totally new creature—the Monarch butterfly. No longer bound to earth, it was free to soar through the air.

Man, too, can become a totally new creature. We can't grow beautiful wings like the caterpillar, but we can be set free through Jesus Christ.

In the Bible, we read of a Pharisee by the name of Nicodemus. One night he came to talk with Jesus in secret. At that time, he thought that

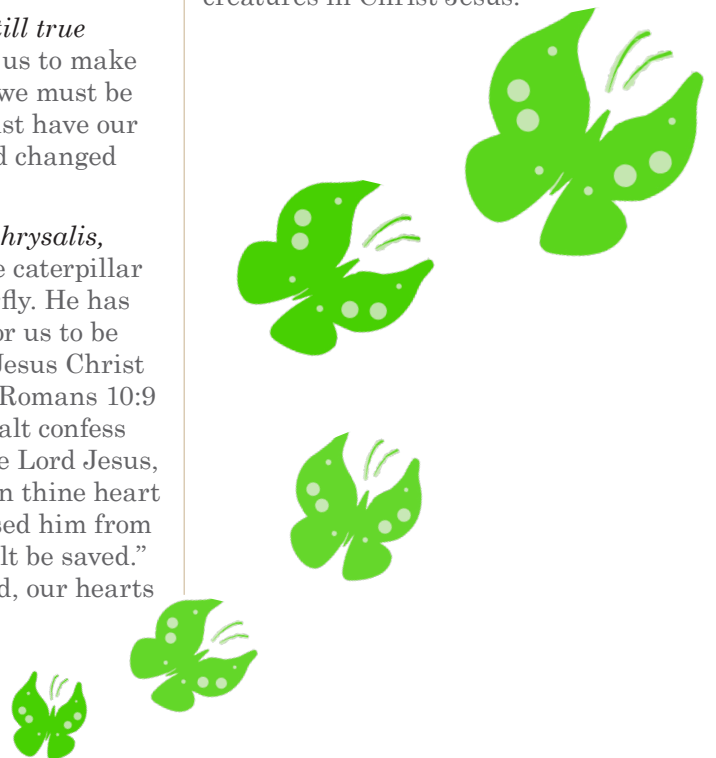
Jesus was only a teacher of God's Word. But he acknowledged Jesus' power by saying that no man could do the miracles Jesus did, unless God was with him. Jesus told him that no man could see the Kingdom of God unless he was born again. That confused Nicodemus, and he asked Jesus how a person could be born twice. Could he become a baby again? Jesus explained that a man could be born again in his heart, not in body. He said, "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God."

Those words are still true today. In order for us to make Heaven our home we must be born again; we must have our heart cleansed and changed by Jesus.

God, through the chrysalis, made a way for the caterpillar to become a butterfly. He has also made a way for us to be changed through Jesus Christ and His Blood. In Romans 10:9 it says, "If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." When we are saved, our hearts become brand new. Instead of wanting to do bad things and disobeying God, we will

want to please Him. We become "a new creature." Romans 8:1 says: "There is therefore now no condemnation [guilt] to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit."

When we become new creatures in Christ, we are freed from the heavy load of guilt that we carried as sinners. In fact, with that load gone, some have said they felt as though they could fly. Like the caterpillar when it becomes a butterfly and is set free, so we are set free from the bonds of sin and become new creatures in Christ Jesus.

Greetings, Friend
Eleazar:

My wife Rhoda and I extend salutations to you and your household. Since you were last here in Jericho, much has taken place which I feel will be of interest to you.

I am sending, by the hand of my messenger who brings you this letter, the 180 shekels which you so generously lent me last year at tax time. As you know, I had no hope of being able to

repay you at so early a date, but remarkable circumstances have taken place which make it possible for me to fulfill my obligation to you now.

Surely you remember the chief tax collector here in Jericho, Zacchaeus. Of course you would! He was the cause of my having to borrow these 180 shekels. He plays an important part in the story I am about to tell you.

In the ninth hour of the second day of this past week, as I was

preparing to close up my shop, I noticed a great throng of people moving along the main street about five hundred paces from my doorway. I was curious to see what was attracting so much attention, so I hastily secured the door and moved to join the crowd.

The first thing I heard, as I neared the throng, was excited talk about a miracle that had just taken place. They were saying that Jesus, the Man we have heard so much about in

past weeks, had just healed a blind beggar who had been sitting outside the gates to the city. Of all the tax gatherers in the area of Jericho, Zacchaeus had to be the most underhanded, greedy one among them. But Jesus responded in a gentle tone, “This day is salvation come to this house.”

As they moved off together, I caught a glimpse of Zacchaeus’

face. He looked like a different person! There was a kind of glow about him, a peace that had never been there before.

I went home and told Rhoda all about what I had seen. We talked about it several times in the days that followed. What could have caused Zacchaeus to make a statement like that? Did he really intend to pay back all that he had wrongfully gained over the years? I could scarcely believe that.

Then, three days ago, Zacchaeus appeared in the doorway of my shop. Though the thought of what I had witnessed a few days earlier was still in my mind, I couldn’t control the feeling of distrust that came over me. Back came the memory of that day last year when he had appeared and handed me that outrageous tax bill. What did he want now?

I greeted him civilly, though I’m sure my apprehension was obvious. But from his first words, it was apparent that this man was changed. “Friend Achim, I have come to pay back the money which I wrongfully took from you. My tax assessment last year was much too large, as, of course, you realized. But I have received salvation from the Lord. I ask your forgiveness, and I wish to restore that wrongful amount to you fourfold.” He placed a pouch in my hand and walked out. To my amazement, when I opened it I found it did contain exactly

four times the amount he had overtaxed me!

In the last three days I’ve heard report after report of others who have had the same experience with Zacchaeus. I can tell you, the whole town is talking about it. What miraculous power this Man, Jesus, must have to make such a change in a person’s life! Of all people, Zacchaeus! Well, that is the explanation of how it is I am able to return your loan so quickly. I hope this letter finds you and your household well. On your next trip to Jericho, we must talk further of this Man, Jesus.

Christian parents want the same for their children today. Sunday school and family devotions are important parts in helping a child find Jesus.

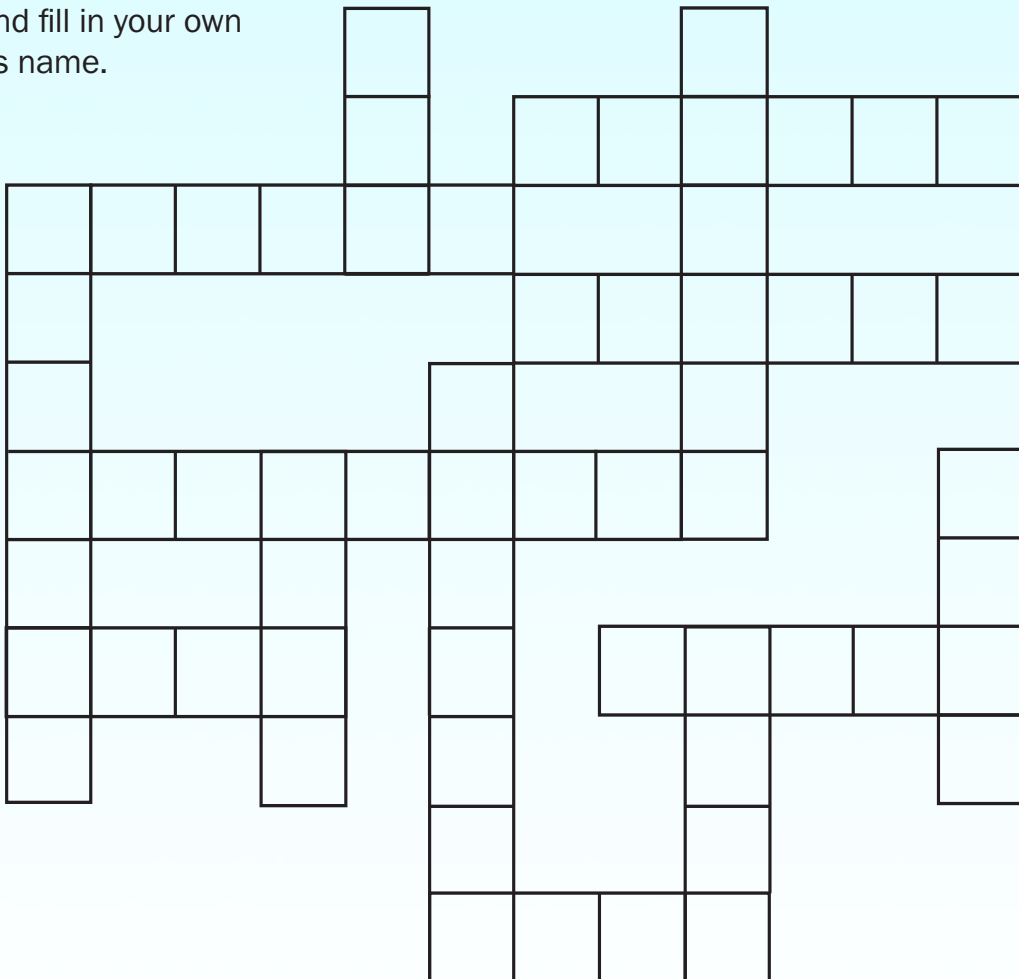

All Oscar could do was to nod miserably. There was not a thing he could say. His name was not called because he had not followed the rules.

Not following the rules can be very dangerous. Someday, God will reward all who have obeyed His rules. What a great time of celebration that will be for those whose names are written in the Lamb's Book of Life! But think of the disappointed ones who did not follow the rules! They will have to appear later at the Great White

Throne Judgment with God as the Judge. Records are being kept. Everything people have said and done that they have not repented of is written down. The books will be opened and those people will be judged. The Book of Life will be there too, so they can see that their names are not written in it.

All kinds of wonderful things are being made ready for the people whose names are written in the Book of Life. But for those who have not chosen to follow Him, there will be no reward. They will be separated from God!

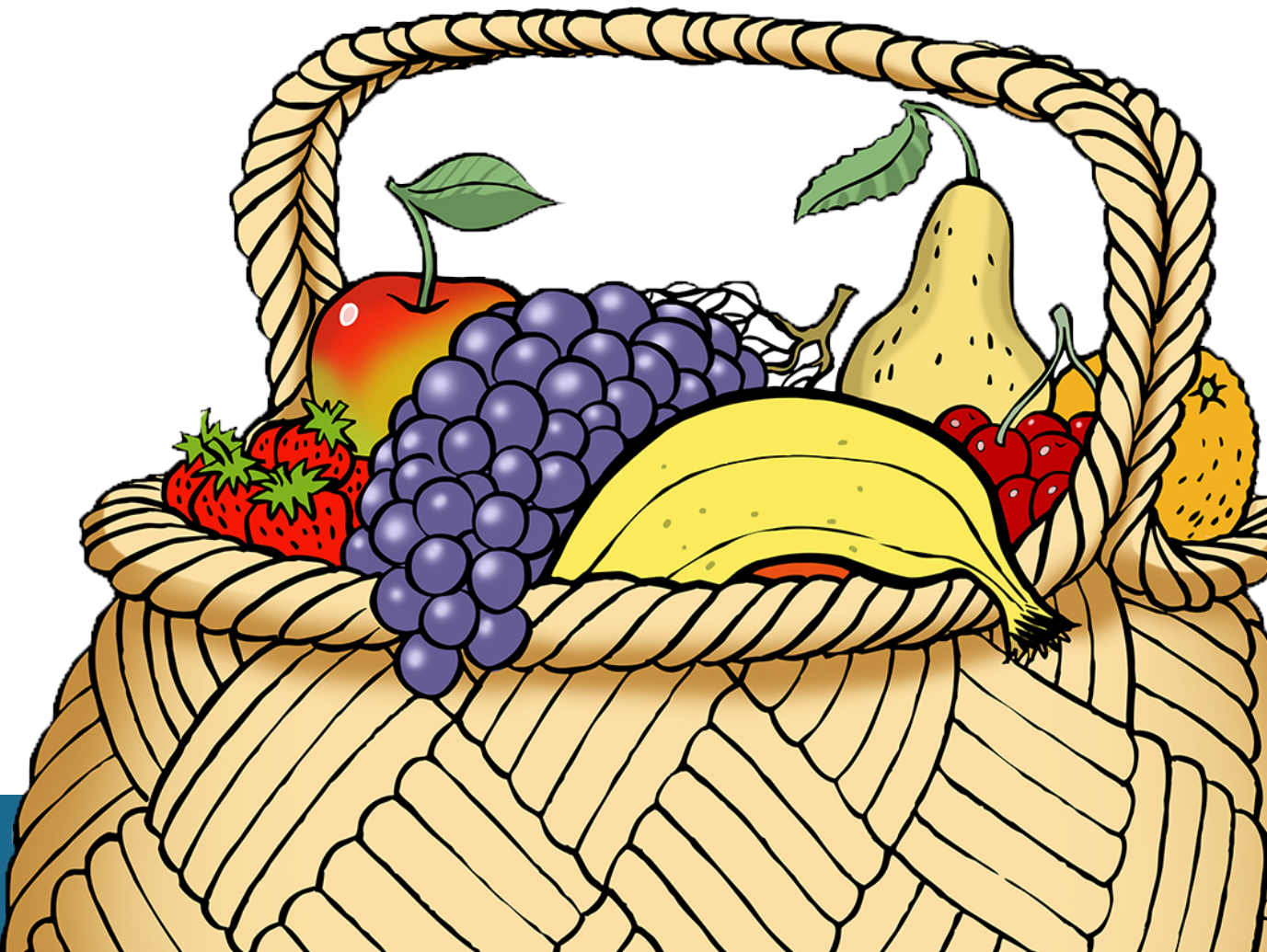

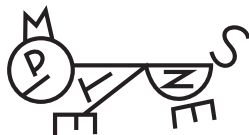


